THE DUBNERS' *PALM BEACH HOMECOMING

NEWLY PROPOSED 'REPOSE'

Alaska's Inside Passage Explored GMC-Style

Today, each year finds millions of Americans, many of them GMC owners, along the roads to discovery just like Lewis and Clark. Unlike the Lewis and Clark expedition, though, modern expeditions, like the Church and Trost Bi-Centennial Expedition, can be enjoyed comfortably in the luxury of a GMC Motorhome.

In planning their 23-day, 8,733-mile expedition from Birmingham, Michigan, to Anchorage, Alaska, and back, the Churches, Roy & Violet, and the Trosts, Norm & Betty, decided on an interesting variation to the well-known ALCAN Highway Route. The route chosen as the most interesting and scenic is known as the Inside Passage and affords some exciting opportunities for land, rail and sea travel.

After deciding upon the Inside Passage route, a detailed itinerary was developed utilizing a most helpful Alaskan highway publication known as the "Mile Post." The two-page itinerary detailed each day's travel by: destination, miles to be traveled and the various exploration sites along the way. The itinerary takes advantage of

the great freedom afforded by the GMC Motorhome and a copy is available to all owners upon a request to the editor.

Alaska's Inside Passage, the highlight of the Church-Trost itinerary. The inside is a 600-mile water route connecting the coastal cities of British Columbia and Alaska. For this most interesting leg of their journey, the expeditioners boarded the steamship Malaspina for the 500-mile cruise from Prince Rupert, British Columbia, to Haines, Alaska.

From Haines, the expedition encountered two more interesting

variations in their mode of travel before reaching Anchorage and Mt. McKinley National Park. The first, another boat excursion found the GMC explorers on the M. V. Bartlett for the 100-mile trip from Prince William Sound to Whittier, where they drove onto a train for the ten mile rail trip to Portage, Alaska. Following Portage, the expedition hit solid ground again and they had clear motorhoming all the way to Anchorage and Mt. McKinley, a most beautiful spot in which to conclude the Church and Trost Bi-Centennial Expedition to Alaska on July 10, 1976.

A few miles down the road, 2,200 to be exact, the group encounters high country and their first snow.
