Allons-nous-en Nouvelles Orleans!

Translation: Let's go — New Orleans!

Which is exactly what dozens of GMC Motorhome Club members are preparing to do. So much so that some clubs have put the GMC-MOA "Mississippi River Fiesta and Second Birthday Party" into their own rally schedules to encourage the greatest possible attendance.

And, looking at the program and the campground and the host city that awaits Fiesta-goers, Wednesday through Sunday, March 1-5, a rally with true memory-building potential is in the making. Sight-seeing and shopping, socializing and relaxing, motorhome-talking and tour-adventuring — all these, and more, are clearly in store.

Planning and arrangements for the Fiesta/Birthday Party have been in the works for weeks. By now, with GMC-MOA members putting the finishing touches on their own preparations, program details are well in hand.

Here, in sequence, is what lies ahead for those who will take part.

Coaches rallying to New Orleans, whether from north, east, or west, will eventually be on Highway I-10 as they approach our campsite at New Orleans Travel Park. To reach the Park, exit I-10 at the US 90 intersection. From there, it's just seven blocks east on US 90 — also known as Chef Menteur Highway — to the Park entrance.

For communications en route, GMC-MOA members are invited to monitor CB Channel 14. Contact call letters are KSD 0108, to raise Gloria & Mac McDonnell.

Should you have need to telephone ahead, the numbers at the New Orleans Travel Park are (504) 246-1991 and (504) 242-7795. Keep these handy, in case of emergency or any unforeseen delay in your arrival plans.

Rolling into the Park, all but the very earliest of Fiesta-goers should easily spot our GMC-MOA additions to the regular facilities. Those additions will be our "Big Tent" and our Service Tent.

The Park's regular facilities, be assured,

are much above the minimal. Full hookups, of course. Then the amenities such as a recreation and rally room, lobby and TV, supermarket and laundromat, and more. Plus two swimming pools, patio, shade trees, and other comforts.

Our campsite, then, can be summed up this way: All the necessities, lots of things nice to have, some touches of luxury — and plenty more, including all of New Orleans — within easy reach!

Now, what's on the schedule?

Wednesday, March 1, begins with Fiesta registration and closes with a Mardi Gras-style Birthday/Champagne Party. The GMC arrival desk will be handling registrations from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Along with the sign-in, this is the proper time to register for those highly-popular GMC Service Clinic offerings such as owner training seminars and coach inspections.

From 8 to 10 a.m., you'll be introduced — if you're new to New Orleans — to the "beignets" that replace doughnuts in this city's version of coffee-and. Beignets (the word rhymes with "rain-yay") are light, fluffy, scrumptious pastries that must be tasted to be known, and once tasted are never forgotten. Honest!

Orientation comes at 10 a.m. Service Seminars run from 1 to 4 p.m. And at 5 p.m., the opening social event — a BYOB Social Hour for which ice and setups will be provided. Figure this to be a one-hour tune-up for the evening's big event.

Our Birthday/Champagne Party is a costume affair in the old Mardi Gras tradition. Prizes are to be awarded for the most original costumes, so many GMC-MOA members are certain to be creating their own raiment for this affair.

But if your costume-making skills are few, or time is short, you'll be able to buy a Mardi Gras costume — right there on the campsite — for only \$8.50! Mac McDonnell has checked these costumes and has this comment:

"These are absolutely the best-made party costumes I've ever seen at this price! They are far better than most rental costumes. And, for \$8.50, they will be superb mementos of our Mississippi River Fiesta Rally and of New Orleans."

Note, please: Masks, also traditional wear at Mardi Gras parties, will be available for purchase at just 50 cents each.

Serving of a Southern Buffet, starting at 7 p.m., precedes the festivities. This buffet is being catered.

We'll move into the party events somewhere around 8 p.m. Besides the judging and prize awards for costumes, this will include the showing and judging and prize awards in our birthday cake competition.

Of course, there will be a cutting of the official GMC-MOA Second Birthday Party cake. And, in all likelihood, more than one toast — in champagne, naturally — to the first two years and all those still to come.

And just to round out the evening, there will be Dixieland Jazz entertainment for the party hours. Type of entertainment? We're promised it will be "super"!

You'll begin Thursday with wake-up coffee and beignets, available from 6:30 a.m.

Then you're off for one of New Orleans' most-famed restaurants and experiences — when we enjoy "Breakfast at Brennan's." For this treat, buses will be leaving the Travel Park at 15-minute intervals, beginning at 7:15 a.m. and continuing until 8:30 a.m.

After breakfast, you have a choice. Take part in an all-morning tour of the city, or use the morning as personal free time as you wish. (This same option will be available on Friday, if you wish to do an organized-type tour of New Orleans.)

Seminars are scheduled for Thursday afternoon, 2 to 5 p.m. And then, you have a choice on how to spend the evening. Your Fiesta registration provides a nightclub tour on either Thursday or Friday. Or you may devote the evening to activities of personal choice.

Friday begins with coffee and beignets,

served from 8 to 9:30 a.m. Then, free time or the city tour for the morning hours. And a program of Seminars from 1 to 4 p.m.

Come the evening hours on Friday, we'll be stepping back in history to the fabled steamboat days on the Mississippi — in a dinner-and-dancing river cruise aboard the sternwheeler "Natchez." Cruise participants are urged to make this a "dress-up" affair.

Buses taking us to the boat landing will depart the Travel Park from 5:45 to 6:15 p.m. Aboard the "Natchez," a cash bar will be open throughout the cruise. There will be continuous food service — beginning with hors d'oeuvres and then a buffet dinner.

To make the cruise a truly fabulous affair, music and dancing will also be continuous. And so will the view of the skyline of New Orleans, the city's historic water-

front, and the riverbank scenes — all visible and all continually changing as we cruise out and then return in a two-and-a-half hour adventure.

Once returned to the dock, buses will be heading two ways: Some will return to the campground. Others will be off on the optional nightclub tour of the French Quarter. Take your choice!

Saturday, after wake-up coffee and beignets, is a Leisure Day. Shop, visit, sight-see, or relax until the Social Hour begins at 5 p.m. This is the prelude to our Potluck Dinner, for which GMC is providing the main entree (see Mac McDonnell's column for some hint of what's in store on this) while each family attending brings a six-person serving of a dish to pass.

There's a prize-winning feature for the Potluck, please note. So be sure to follow instructions on identifying your dish. You

could be a winner!

Following the Potluck, we're in for more of that great New Orleans jazz — marching music and, perchance, music for dancing as well. So this shapes up as another evening to anticipate, and then to remember!

Remember, too, that two special contests will be judged for prize awards during the Mississippi River Fiesta Rally. Look for the display of GMC Photo-Fun V entries, those pictures of GMC Motorhomes in places and positions and pursuits which their proud owners have captured on film and want to share with you.

A very special group of Fiesta-goers will be invited to compete in another prize-winning program. All 12-and-under youngsters at the Mississippi River Fiesta will be offered a just-for-GMC coloring book and crayons with which to show their

talents. They'll have a chance to submit samples of their work for judging — and for the prizes to be given in various age groups. This should be something to see!





We have just returned from down New Orleans way, finalizing details for our GMC Motorhome Owners National Rally — the Mississippi River Fiesta. Currently the excitement of "Mardi Gras" has all the natives involved in the celebration — along with those visitors here to attend the many gala affairs taking place in this beautiful city.

GMC's Mississippi River Fiesta will, of course, follow the Mardi Gras. But the spirit of the festivities will remain for all of us, with five fun-filled days together in New Orleans.

MORE GOOD NEWS!

The Rally heralds our "second birthday" as the GMC Motorhome Owners Club and we will hold our own Mini-Mardi Gras — with breakfast at Brennan's (sponsored by GMC Truck & Coach), jazz bands, costumes, contests, prizes, an evening cruise on the beautiful Mississippi while the band plays on, good food, good friends, service seminars, product seminars, two champagne parties, and our famous GMC potluck (prepared by the world's best chefs — our wives — with the entree prepared by the award-winning Leopoldo Hirsch, Executive Chef of Ro Jé).

If you haven't sent us your reservations for this GMC FUN-TIVITY, act now!

Speaking of the GMC Motorhome Owners Association, let us take a few lines of this column to discuss some of the programs being developed as part of the membership.

• We have just completed the GMC-MOA "I-D cards". These designate the member's number, GMC Motorhome Serial Number, the date of your membership, and, if you are a "chapter member", it includes identification of your chapter affiliation. The I-D cards are in the mail, and should be in the member's possession soon.

• Early in the month of March, each member will be sent an insurance policy covering accidental death and dismemberment as part of their extended benefits in the Association. (The delay for the moment is that we are awaiting written approval of the Arizona Insurance Commission.) We have pursued this program for many months, and to the best of our knowledge no other motorhome club extends this type of coverage with the membership. Most associations or clubs may offer an insurance program for additional cost, but ours is part of the GMC-MOA membership.

• We now have a GMC-MOA "film and camera club" which offers unusual services as well as Kodak-approved film processing and buy-by-mail film purchases. What's unusual? GMC Adds Details to Phase-out Plans

Phasing out production of an outstanding prestige product line such as the GMC Motorhome and TransMode is a process calling for careful, detailed study all the way. That's reflected in the deliberate and studied approach being pursued by the GMC Truck & Coach Division of General Motors Corporation in following up the November announcement that the line would be discontinued.

Just to refresh your memory: In that initial press release Robert W. Truxell, General Manager of GMC Truck & Coach Division, stated that he wanted to concentrate more of the division's efforts in the area of light, medium, and heavy trucks. Other GMC announcements have indicated that a factor in this decision is the down-sizing of engines and other related components — a process which means the power train presently utilized in the GMC Motorhome and TransMode would be phased out.

With dozens of factors to be weighed, working our final plans for the phase-out of these vehicles is a slow process. But as

decisions are reached, GMC Truck & Coach management is striving to provide reliable information to all interested parties. This includes both GMC dealers and GMC Motorhome owners as well as the division's employees.

The three most-asked questions on the part of GMC Motorhome owners, when hearing of the planned phase-out, were these:

1. Will I be able to get replacement parts if I should need that kind of repairs, say year after next?

2. My GMC Motorhome is special; it has many unique systems like my suspension. Where will I get it serviced in the years ahead?

3. What's going to happen to our Club?

Here, from a letter sent to GMC dealers recently, are some positive answers to all three questions. In the same order as the inquiries:

1. **Parts Availability.** Service parts of all types to ensure satisfaction of motorhome owners will continue to be available. GM Parts Division is working closely with GMC to assure that no interruption in service will occur.

2. GMC will continue to provide service and warranty through a nationwide group of GMC Motorhome Service dealers. Even after production ceases, General Motors dealers will be able to provide you with service and warranty.

3. **GMC Motorhome Owners Clubs.** "GMC will continue to support the 24 exist-

ing clubs through the calendar year of 1978." The GMC Motorhome Owners Association, Inc., is non-profit and completely independent of, and separate from, GMC Truck & Coach. As such, its members may take necessary action to continue indefinitely. Any inquiries about joining the Association, renewing memberships, and the like, should be sent directly to GMC-MOA, Inc., 7333 E. Monterey Way #4, P.O. Box 2005, Scottsdale, Arizona 85252. The phone number is (602) 949-8266. Mac and Gloria McDonnell will continue to be the National Directors.

It is our intention to continue the TRAVELER newsletter through the 1978 calendar year. It is also our plan to include other recreational vehicles and, in this revised format, the publication may continue even longer. Your comments and articles along with pictures will be most welcome.

You've already been advised that GMC will support the New Orleans Rally scheduled for March 1-5, and the Summer Rally at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin scheduled for July 19-23. So make your plans now to be with us and join in the fun. You will be given more details in future issues of the TRAVELER.

As mentioned earlier, we look forward to your comments. And, of course, any questions you may have are most welcome. We'd like to stay in touch with you, and we hope that you'll stay in touch with us.
